Declan Lawn

is a screenwriter and director. He worked for 15 years as a reporter, director and producer for BBC Current Affairs Television on programmes such as *Panorama* and *Spotlight*. He now works with Adam Patterson, writing and directing television drama and feature films. Together they wrote the BBC TV

drama *The Salisbury Poisonings* (2020), and the short film *Rough*, which won the IFTA award in 2021 for best short film, as well as at the Krakow International Film Festival and the Kerry International Film Festival. They recently finished their first feature film, *Freegard*, starring James Norton and Gemma

Arterton, which they wrote and directed. It will be released early in 2022. Filming also begins in January 2022 on a BBC One Drama, *Blue Lights*, a six-part series about rookie police officers in Belfast, where Declan lives with his wife and four children.

Case study: The Salisbury Poisonings



is a fact-based television drama, starring Anne-Marie Duff, Rafe Spall and Annabel Scholey. It portrays the 2018 Novichok

poisonings and decontamination crisis in Salisbury, England. The series was broadcast in three parts on BBC One in June 2020, and in four parts on RTÉ in July - August 2021. On 4 March 2018, Sergei Skripal (66), a former Russian military officer and double agent for British intelligence agencies, and his daughter Yulia Skripal (33), were found unconscious on a public bench by a passing nurse and doctor. They had been poisoned with Novichok. The news of the poisonings sparked international controversy. The British government accused Russia of attempted murder and announced a series of punitive measures, including the expulsion of diplomats.

Those attending will:

- Watch The Salisbury Poisonings
 on the RTÉ Player (4x45 minutes) or on the
 BBC iPlayer (3x60 minutes) in advance, with
 a view to answering a series of questions set
 by Declan Lawn.
- On the evening of the masterclass, break into teamwork groups for 40 minutes to consider those questions among themselves; Declan will spend time with each group.
- Then all join Declan to discuss those questions, followed by an open forum.

Cleraun Media Ethics Forum

With the ongoing support of the Broadcasting Authority of Ireland (BAI), Cleraun Media Conferences (www.cleraunmedia.com) developed from a small event in 1986 into a national conference focussing on professional integrity and ethics. Following the last conference, it was decided to organise online masterclasses every few months for smaller numbers of young documentary filmmakers and journalists. The aim is to allow those taking part to develop a network of contacts who could help one another when facing challenges in the context of professional integrity and ethics. The masterclasses are supported by Screen Skills Ireland and the BAI.
